Roll call showed Cynthia Abraham, Bob Bachman, Tim Benjamin, Pat Hahn, Joyce Price, and Terry Stamm present. Pat Lien was absent.

#### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Benjamin/Bachman moved and seconded a motion to approve the Village Board minutes of June 19, 2023 and July 3, 2023. Motion carried.

#### **Special Committee Reports:**

<u>Plan Commission:</u> Terry Stamm reported that the Plan Commission did not meet.

#### **Report from Fire Board Representative**

Terry Stamm reported that the department responded to four calls in the last month. There are still discussions about having an ambulance at the fire station.

The department now has 25 firefighters. Chief Feuster plans to acquire extra personal equipment such as helmets and gloves. Dan Williams is continuing with fire inspections and re-inspections.

The department is looking into the purchase of 4 or 5 cameras due to recent vandalism. They are also looking to perform driveway improvements at the Tom Kopp irrigation water supply station south of Elk Mound.

Chief Feuster is continuing to research payment options for a wet rescue vehicle. It is estimated to cost the Fire District \$25,000 per year for 10 years.

The computer belonging to the previous fire chief is available for donation to an area agency. A budget comparison report was also provided by Chief Feuster.

#### Report from Elk Mound/Colfax Solid Waste & Recycling-

Terry Stamm reported that the Board is working with the Town of Elk Mound on fill removal at the Elk Mound site. They are also working with Sylvester Custom Grinding to grind up the brush pile and Nedland Industries for a repair program for the compactors. Jenson Farms is also assisting the unit in disposal of yard waste piles at both the Colfax and Elk Mound sites to meet DNR requirements.

<u>Colfax Rescue Squad Monthly Report:</u> The Colfax Rescue Squad Monthly Report from Don Knutson for May and June was reviewed. This is available in the Village Clerk-Treasurer's Office.

<u>Community Center/Library Report:</u> Terry Stamm reported that the Community Center/Library Board did not meet. A meeting is scheduled for July 24.

#### Communications & Miscellaneous Business as Permitted

by Law: Karin Wolf reported that the preliminary estimates of the 2024 state shared revenue distributions show the village receiving \$272,692, which is over \$46,000 more than 2023. She also mentioned that the League of Wisconsin Municipalities was offering Local Government 101 training in Altoona, which is highly recommended for board members. Wolf also reported that the village received a mailing from Buell Consulting, asking us to complete a Business Terms Agreement if we are interested in being considered as a location for a cell phone tower. She will be submitting this for the village.

Trustee Tim Benjamin encouraged everyone to attend the Paint the Town event in Menomonie on July 22.

President Terry Stamm reported that the Lions Club fundraiser at the annual coach pitch tournament was a big success. He commended the Public Works department for their hard work preparing the park for the event.

#### DRUG TAKE BACK DAY—OCTOBER 28, 2023

The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) in conjunction with the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) is coordinating a prescription drug take back initiative throughout Wisconsin. According to the Drug Enforcement Agency, the drug overdose epidemic in the United States is a clear and present public health, public safety, and national security threat.

It's a community responsibility to turn in unneeded medications. Removing them from homes will prevent them from being accidentally ingested, stolen, misused or abused. The Elk Mound Police Department is happy to provide a local drop site for these unneeded medications.

Proper disposal keeps our communities healthier! Outdated medications should never be flushed or poured down the drain. According to the DOJ, wastewater treatment is not designed to remove all of these medications from the water, and trace amounts of pharmaceuticals are showing up in rivers and lakes around the world.

Please take a minute to clean out your medicine cabinet and bring expired or unused medications to the Elk Mound Police Department, E206 Menomonie Street on October 28th from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

#### What to bring

Prescription and over-the-counter medications may be disposed of at Drug Take Back Day collection sites, including:

- Capsules
- Creams
- Inhalers
- Non-aerosol sprays
- Ointments
- Patches
- Pills
- Vials

Liquids must be in their original container.

Pet medications are accepted.

Vape pens are accepted with the batteries removed.

Other e-cigarette devices are accepted with the batteries removed. These batteries are highly flammable. That's why it is important that the batteries are removed before the pen or device is placed in a collection bin.

#### The following items are not accepted:

- Aerosol cans
- Anything containing blood or a bodily fluid
- Household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas)
- Illegal drugs
- · Iodine containing medications
- · Mercury thermometers
- Personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, etc.)
- Sharps/syringes
- Vape pens/e-cigarette devices with a built-in battery that cannot be removed

#### WARNING SIREN



When severe weather occurs, you will hear a steady tone for three minutes. Upon early warning, volunteers will attempt to set the Warning Siren to a STEADY TONE. This warning is to inform you to seek information from TV or RADIO. For residents that do not have adequate shelter, the Lutheran Church, 207 University Street, has offered the use of the church basement. Every effort will be made to get the rear (south) doors opened on alarm. YOU SHOULD MAKE ALTERNATE PLANS IN THE EVENT THE CHURCH IS NOT OPEN!!

Having a plan in place will minimize confusion when time is of the essence. Preplanning to bring flashlights, possibly a blanket, as well as making other arrangements for pets will make for quick access to shelter. (Please do not bring pets to the Church).

### This plan will be in effect immediately and until further notice.

"Weather Alert" radios are available for purchase at local electronics or major department stores. These units can be used in addition to the local warning siren for early severe storm alerts.

According to Dunn County Emergency Management, the siren is intended to alert people outdoors that severe weather conditions are nearby. The sounding of these sirens is your cue to access local detailed weather information from radio or television and discover if there is an need to take further action. More information can be found on their site: www.dunn.wi.co.us, click on Departments, Emergency Management & Outdoor Warning Sirens.

Dunn County Communications Center is responsible for testing the emergency siren system. The Emergency Warning Siren is tested the first Monday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Standard emergency warning siren electro-mechanical tones are as follows:

ALERT— Steady Tone, 3 minutes
ATTACK—Wailing Tone, 6 sec. Hi/6 sec. Low, 3 min
FIRE— Wailing Tone, 16 sec. Hi/8 Sec. Low, 4 Cycles
GROWL- Short Burst, 2 Sec. Used for testing of siren only.

# VILLAGE PARK RENTAL INFORMATION

The park located at S405 Holly Avenue (Highway H) offers men's and women's restroom facilities, a lighted pavilion with 15 picnic tables, soccer fields, a 9-hole disc golf course, volleyball nets, horse-shoe pits, a basketball court and playground equipment. The park pavilion is a perfect place for food preparation; offering kitchen utilities including stove, refrigerators and chest coolers, 4 grills and a large serving counter.

The Village park is available for rent for \$100.00 per day for Elk Mound Village Residents, and \$150.00 per day for Non-Residents. These fees go toward the cost of continuous park maintenance, along with cleanup and garbage removal for your specific event. Any proceeds from park rentals will go toward park improvements.

Keep in mind there may be other activity on the ball fields as they are rented separately. We have very active baseball & softball youth groups in the area.
