Roll call showed Cynthia Abraham, Bob Bachman, Tim Benjamin, Pat Hahn, Pat Lien, Joyce Price, and Terry Stamm present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Abraham/Bachman moved and seconded a motion to approve the Village Board minutes of July 17, 2023 and August 7, 2023. Motion carried.

The Fire Board and Chief Feuster are looking into banking options for the department. New gloves and boots were ordered for personnel. The Department also applied for a DNR grant for an AED machine and foam.

The Board also approved spending approximately \$6,770 to have TW Services construct a driveway on County Highway E for Fire Department personnel to get water from a well as needed.

Report from Elk Mound/Colfax Solid Waste & Recycling

Terry Stamm reported that all member representatives of the Colfax RU will be meeting at the Colfax Fire Station at 7:00 p.m. on August 22 for their semi-annual meeting. Lynn Niggemann and Terry Stamm held a training meeting for all of the site attendants on August 15.

Sylvester Grinding Company completed the grinding of the Elk Mound site brush pile on August 14. Jenson Farm personnel hauled the yard waste pile to their farms for proper disposal to meet DNR requirements.

Colfax Rescue Squad Monthly Report

The Colfax Rescue Squad Monthly Report from Don Knutson for July was reviewed. This is available in the Village Clerk-Treasurer's Office.

Community Center/Library Report

Terry Stamm reported that the Community Center/Library Board did meet on July 24, but the report was not available at this meeting. It will be covered next month.

<u>Communications & Miscellaneous Business as</u> Permitted by <u>Law</u>

Director of Public Works Mark Levra reported that he was contacted by Jim Rooney about a possible Phase Two of the Settlers Ridge development. Mr. Rooney would like to work with his attorney to investigate the possibility of a private well to meet the water needs for additional phases of the development.

Trustee Pat Hahn mentioned that it would be beneficial to have an index of ordinances on the village website.

Trustee Tim Benjamin attended the monthly Dunn County Economic Development Corporation board meeting. They are hosting a community engagement event in Colfax next month and may hold a similar event in Elk Mound in the future.

He also reported that he and several other residents of North Holly Avenue have been unhappy with the riding of dirt bikes in a vacant lot in their neighborhood.

Trustee Pat Lien reported an issue with people dumping trash and other large items behind the storage units on West Menomonie Street. President Terry Stamm mentioned that the Colfax Rescue Squad's annual meeting will be held on August 30 at 7:00 p.m.

Clerk/Treasurer Karin Wolf reported that the library is trying new hours on Wednesdays from 9 a.m. -1 p.m. Monday and Friday hours will remain the same. The new village website is progressing along and will hopefully be live by the end of the month. Hailee Bushman from West Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission contacted the village to see if the Board would be interested in updating its Safe Routes to School plan. This item will be placed on the next agenda.

Director of Public Works Mark Levra mentioned that the Elk Mound Travel Stop was closing on September 5 at 10:00 p.m. Public works filled up all vehicles prior to the closure and the Clerk/Treasurer is looking into a new charge card that will work at all gas stations. He also met with two Lions Club members regarding a couple of projects. The Lions Club is also paying for new Christmas decorations to be hung on six electric poles in the village.

TRICK OR TREATING SAFETY TIPS

Some important Halloween safety tips from Ready Wisconsin are as follows:

- Never go alone—Children under the age of 12 should always have an adult with them. Children over the age of 12 should walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- 2. Trick or treaters should only **go to well-lit homes** and never accept rides from strangers.
- After dark, everyone in your group should carry a flashlight or light stick. Add reflective tape to costumes to help drivers see while walking along dark streets.
- 4. Watch the roads—Drivers should be on the lookout for trick-or-treaters walking on roadways and crossing the streets. Know when people will be out in your community and drive with caution when going through neighborhoods.
- Check treats before eating—An adult should inspect all candy and other treats for tapering, choking hazards and potential allergens.

DRUG TAKE BACK DAY—OCTOBER 28, 2023

The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) in conjunction with the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) is coordinating a prescription drug take back initiative throughout Wisconsin. According to the Drug Enforcement Agency, the drug overdose epidemic in the United States is a clear and present public health, public safety, and national security threat.

It's a community responsibility to turn in unneeded medications. Removing them from homes will prevent them from being accidentally ingested, stolen, misused or abused. The Elk Mound Police Department is happy to provide a local drop site for these unneeded medications.

Proper disposal keeps our communities healthier! Outdated medications should never be flushed or poured down the drain. According to the DOJ, wastewater treatment is not designed to remove all of these medications from the water, and trace amounts of pharmaceuticals are showing up in rivers and lakes around the world.

Please take a few minutes to clean out your medicine cabinet and bring expired or unused medications to the Elk Mound Police Department, E206 Menomonie Street on October 28th from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

What to bring

Prescription and over-the-counter medications may be disposed of at Drug Take Back Day collection sites, including:

- Capsules
- Creams
- Inhalers
- Non-aerosol sprays
- Ointments
- Patches
- Pills
- Vials

Liquids must be in their original container.

Pet medications are accepted.

Vape pens are accepted with the batteries removed. Other e-cigarette devices are accepted with the batteries removed. These batteries are highly flammable. That's why it is important that the batteries are removed before the pen or device is placed in a collection bin.

The following items are not accepted:

- Aerosol cans
- Anything containing blood or a bodily fluid
- Household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas)
- Illegal drugs
- · Iodine containing medications
- · Mercury thermometers
- Personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, etc.)
- Sharps/syringes
- Vape pens/e-cigarette devices with a built-in battery that cannot be removed

WARNING SIREN



When severe weather occurs, you will hear a steady tone for three minutes. Upon early warning, volunteers will attempt to set the Warning Siren to a STEADY TONE. This warning is to inform you to seek information from TV or RADIO. For residents that do not have adequate shelter, the Lutheran Church, 207 University Street, has offered the use of the church basement. Every effort will be made to get the rear (south) doors opened on alarm. YOU SHOULD MAKE ALTERNATE PLANS IN THE EVENT THE CHURCH IS NOT OPEN!!

Having a plan in place will minimize confusion when time is of the essence. Preplanning to bring flashlights, possibly a blanket, as well as making other arrangements for pets will make for quick access to shelter. (Please do not bring pets to the Church).

This plan will be in effect immediately and until further notice.

"Weather Alert" radios are available for purchase at local electronics or major department stores. These units can be used in addition to the local warning siren for early severe storm alerts.

According to Dunn County Emergency Management, the siren is intended to alert people outdoors that severe weather conditions are nearby. The sounding of these sirens is your cue to access local detailed weather information from radio or television and discover if there is an need to take further action. Dunn County Communications Center is responsible for testing the emergency siren system. The Emergency Warning Siren is tested the first Monday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Standard emergency warning siren electro-mechanical tones are as follows:

ALERT— Steady Tone, 3 minutes

ATTACK—Wailing Tone, 6 sec. Hi/6 sec. Low, 3 min

FIRE— Wailing Tone, 16 sec. Hi/8 Sec. Low, 4 Cycles

GROWL- Short Burst, 2 Sec. Used for testing of siren only.

VILLAGE PARK RENTAL INFORMATION

The park located at S405 Holly Avenue (Highway H) offers men's and women's restroom facilities, a lighted pavilion with 15 picnic tables, soccer fields, a 9-hole disc golf course, volleyball nets, horse-shoe pits, a basketball court and playground equipment. The park pavilion is a perfect place for food preparation; offering kitchen utilities including stove, refrigerators and chest coolers, 4 grills and a large serving counter.

The Village park is available for rent for \$100.00 per day for Elk Mound Village Residents, and \$150.00 per day for Non-Residents. These fees go toward the cost of continuous park maintenance, along with cleanup and garbage removal for your specific event. Any proceeds from park rentals will go toward park improvements.

Keep in mind there may be other activity on the ball fields as they are rented separately. We have very active baseball & softball youth groups in the area.
